Happy Father's Day!

Father's Day is celebrated in June in the vast number of the

world's countries. The idea for the day began in Spokane, Washington. While listening to a Mother's Day sermon in 1909, Sonora Smart Dodd thought how much she would like to honor her father. The month of June was chosen for the simple fact that that was the month of her father's birth.

June 19, 1910, was the first
Father's Day. While Dodd primarily
wanted to honor this selfless man
who had raised her and five others
after their mother died in childbirth,
the popularity of the day soon
spread. The date was firmly planted
in many people's minds before
President Richard Nixon established
the permanent national observance of
Father's Day to be held on the third
Sunday of June.

Unlike Mother's Day – which began as a day for mothers to work for peace – this day has always been one simply for recognizing the good gifts of fathers. This of course is not always the case, as there are fathers who do not care for children. Yet for each of us, there are those men who have provided – and continue to provide – wisdom beyond measure, wise counsel, and will toss a ball at a moment's notice.

Pentecost symbols

Acts 2:1-21 tells the story of something amazing happening to the disciples at the feast of Pentecost. They experienced God's Spirit arriving like a rushing wind, and it looked like tongues of fire resting on the disciples' heads.

Both wind and fire are sources of energy. Pentecost reminds us that the Holy Spirit is God's energy within us, both as individual Christians and as the church. It is the Holy Spirit that gives us the energy to do the things that Jesus wants us to do. At Pentecost, people sometimes wear red and many churches use red banners and other decorations to symbolize the flames of fire.

Another very common symbol for the Holy Spirit is the dove, because in other Bible passages – especially Jesus' baptism (see, for example, Matthew 3:16) God's Spirit appears as a dove.
